CLOSE ENCOUNTERS

March 1978 will always be remembered as the month in which 25 members of the DUA were given their notice, foreshadowing the end of archaeology in the City as we know it. Here, for the record, is an unabridged version of this Easter Story, the passion, imminent crucifixion and temporary resurrection of the DUA.

Since October 1976, the DUA employed JCP staff on a project scheduled to run until April 14 1978. In August 1977, the CUA applied for a 25-person S.T.E.P. to replace it, and received favourable noises from their Inner Sanctum. Our application had not been officially confirmed by the MSC on the "deadline" of Feb 28, and news of the decision was deferred until the March Monthly Meeting. The information was not forthcoming on that date, but was promised on Friday 10. Alas: no news was bad news, and no progress had been made by midday on Monday 13. Strike action was considered at a JCP meeting that afternoon, and frantic phone calls to Princethorpe followed.

On Tues 14 Brian Hobley reassured the JCP staff that he was doing everything in his power to get the STEP scheme implemented: if it fell through, all was not lost as he was negotiating with an unknown source for a sum of money to save the day. If neither option worked out, he offered to shoot himself, and promptly

issued 25 members of staff with one months written notice.

The meeting on 15th resulted in a letter being drafted by the staff, which pleaded with the heel dragging MSC to include our application for a STEP scheme on their Agenda for Tues 21 March. The letter was delivered by hand, and resulted in our case being aired. However, our application was rejected. The JCP staff then decided to take their 2-3 weeks holiday to which they were fully entitled, forthwith. This action would have provided a picture of the JCP-less DUA for anyone who wished to know what the Unit would look like after April 14, if the Unnamed Source backed out.

On Thurs 23, Tony Dyson chaired a meeting in which he brought the despondent diggers up to date with the latest non-events in what he accurately described as "this turgid narrative". Such hope as was left centred on the Source, uncontactable

until the following Tuesday.

A miserable Easter concluded on March 30 when the CUA, after many a phone call, advised us to "be prepared for any eventuality". Strike action was only averted by the hope that the Friday talk-in with Hobley, Hebditch (for the Muse) and Davison and Mrs Jones (for the DOE) would save the day. An action committee, (The Basinghall Five) was elected and mandated to write to Brian Davison communicating to him our collective anxieties, and a last ditch deputation was sent with yet more letters to MSC.

In the end, the Godfather, our favourite Inspector, took the trouble to report back to us personally on Friday afternoon, when he and the CUA announced that the DOE would provide a 3 month contract for all the outgoing JCP staff. Furthermore, long term plans were being laid to ensure that current manning (?personing) levels would be maintained on a more permanent footing in future: the promise of a 3 year rolling programme sounded almost to good to be true after the recent chain of events, but a just reward for our persistent efforts.

We would like to convey our best wishes and crossed fingers to all who negotiate on our behalf in the difficult and delicate months ahead and hope that the outcome will not be a squalid sequel to that already encountered, but

a result worthy of our cause, the Future of London's Past.

No prizes for guessing the first item on the agenda at the Monthly on the 4th April. The DoE's 3 month grant should give us the time to examine the funding for the JCP staff for the rest of the financial year, leading to the eventual merging of the 25 JCPs with the 27 contracted staff, and, ultimately, parity with the Museum. Mike and Father John will be called in as soon as negotiations start. Meanwhile, any vacancies which may arise will be filled (probably by Old Hands) to maintain staff levels.

Mr Flude will be allowed to remain as the JCP rep., without portfolio. The officers reported that Tony had completed his Aldermanbury study (Fri. April 10th!) and that the Riverside Wall Report -C.Hill et al-will be ready on Thurs. Phillip found a C10th black Rattus rattus in St Magnus, which had once been to York somewhat earlier, and his girls still find horn cores on Wednesdays. Peter Boyd had a short month & muscular spasms while Jane and Simon tackle Via Lactis. Peter Marsden has found two stone buildings contemporary with the Forum in the late 1st century, and Sarah has made excellent copies of the Hodgensia marvelled at last month. Mike now has a drying cabinet and the largest shoe report ever published. The Basment is now full up, so the CUA promised to take up the matter of storage space elsewhere forthwith. Clive is back from hospital and is enjoying the Aldgate pot, while Chris Green has been drafting a constitution for draughtsmen.

The publication programme was discussed, and will be even more so at the Section Heads meeting next Tues, along with Bastion 6. Apart from a never ending round of meetings, Barn Hobley arrived at the End of Roman Britain while visiting Durham recently -Richard Reece will explain all on 25th April.

The excavation, restoration and landscaping of Cripplegate may begin in the summer -could be a few jobs there. Finally, the DUA has just been awarded a showcase in the galleries of the Museum: we take over the cabinet formerly occupied by a ventriloquist's dummy.

Progress on Steve's site suffered as a result of recent traumas. However, life on the GPO is rapidly getting down to natural, and over half the area has already reached the Hadrianix. The tea-spoons of Val, Ron, Pauline, Pat, the Jackies and new Brenda have been returned to the mess hut now that the excavation of the 200 best recorded stake-holes in Western Europe is complete. Jenny Angela and Dame Edna are all pitting, Kieron is amusing Julie, Simon has had some help with his pot-washing, and Clare won the Find of the Month award: a plumb bob sealed 'neath the floor of a Roman building.

Over the other side of town, Father John, Lez & David have picked up an impressive 8' wide lump of Roman wall, standing 5' above sandstone plinth level, complete with internal and external faces, tile course and bits of bank. They should have about three more weeks before moving to pastures new, having completed an historic multi-part section across the City defences.

On the riverfront, Louise has engineered a minor miracle virtually single handed: her untiring winter site-watching of the Fresh Wharf development has provided her with no less than 41 sections through the archaeology. Features encountered included a piled chalk raft very similar to the BC75 River wall, 2 seperate phases of timber built Roman quay, Saxon banks, and medieval reverments, walls, buildings and lanes.

Ken Powell has stopped being a groupie for Blondie, and now surveys for the Transport Trust: its a great job, taking our Ken around the historic railways and canals of southern England. He's still prepared to remain as captain of the DUA's Aqua Ducks every Wednesday!

Orpah, the Assistant Field Officer at St Aines is preparing the Friends Burial site (Live Stiffs) report— see London Archaeol., summer Issue. She's promised to give us a quick seminar on this most important site soon.

A STEP IN THE WRONG DIRECTION?

Now that the dust has settled it's a good time to review the effects of the Job Creation Scheme for the D.U.A. Four J.C.P.'s, Kevin, Julie, Ian and Clare went to see the Central Unit of the Job Creation Scheme where they had a very friendly and informative reception which has enabled us at last to appreciate the Manpower Services Commission viewpoint.

The facts are these:- S.T.E.P. was a tightening up of the J.C.P. scheme and not the liberalisation that we had been lead to believe. Therefore the M.S.C. had set up a target population for whom the scheme was aimed. These were the long term unemployed, especially the young and those in deprived areas. The ultimate aim of the scheme is to place people in permanent not temporary jobs, apparently so far the M.S.C. success rate is 80%. Sponsors can cash in on the free labour to train the J.C.P.'s but should have the potential to employ that person if things work out. The aim is therefore not to promote socially useful projects but to alleviate hardship due to unemployment.

By now it must be apparent that the D.U.A. did not fulfill these conditions in the past and made a fatal mistake in misreading the situation so that the S.T.E.P. application was pitched at the wrong level. Firstly, most people at the D.U.A., by virtue of their education, were not long term unemployed and would have a reasonable expectation of employment elsewhere. Secondly, M.S.C. didn't see the City as a deprived area. Thirdly, a continuing scheme could be seen to be propping up the D.U.A. and preventing the very thing the M.S.C. hopes to promote i.e. the creation of permanent jobs: in fact the D.U.A. proposed to increase the number of temporary jobs to 35:

The D.U.A. should consider that unless the above conditions can be met in future it should not entertain a S.T.E.P. scheme. Surely there are moral obligations not to divert funds needed to alleviate hardship nor to employ temporary workers unless there is at least the potential to employ them full time at the end of their scheme.

Good things to come out of the scheme? IS months free digging for the D.U.A. and the acknowledgement by the D.O.E. that we need an integral team of 60.

The letter written by the J.C.P.'s to the Times last summer accurately stated the case that the J.C.P. scheme was being used by the D.O.E. to run archaeology at the expense of permanent jobs.

No.4: THE PHONOLITHS

No, this isn't the title of a Science Fiction movie, but in October 1974 I went on a package tour to Ethiopia. It flew from Heathrow to Asmara the largest city in the north. We only stayed one day, just long enough to see some of the surrounding mountains, the mosque and the Coptic (monophisite) cathedral with its stone bells (phonoliths). These were blocks of stone, presumably with a high metal content. As they are in the courtyard one could hit them and they 'boinggg', 'clangg' or tinkle, according to pitch.

Next day we flew in a war-surplus C-47 to Aksum. Here are numerous tall obelisks, and the cathedral of 1665 which is built on the foundations of a 4th century cathedral, founded when the Axumite Empire adopted christianity.

Next day we flew in another 'antique' to Makale which is a trading centre for salt, which is mined near the shores of the Red Sea and transported by camel trains 50-100 strong. By the time it arrives in Makale it is covered in flies, filth and dirt. Luckily it's used mainly for currency.

That afternoon we drove a few miles to see a small country church. It is rectangular in plan, which suggests an old date. Despite a thorough search by the guide, the priest and keys were nowhere to be found. So we were left to improvise tunes on the phonoliths and watch the nearby waterfall, about 40ft. broad and 250ft. high.

Another church was next days objective. The monophisite church of Abraha—Atsba at Wokro is one of Ethiopias hundred or so 'rock-cut' churches which are carved from rock in the manner of a very intricate cave (with all the usual architectural details) instead of being built in the normal 'stone-upon-stone' technique. The Ethiopian guide said it was 4th century, but western authorities think about 1000 years. Crawling, juddering and bouncing along the track to Makale it was obvious why we flew to most places, as the roads in Ethiopia are abominable and we'd not have time to see much!


I was glad we flew to Lalibela next day. The old C-47 touched down on an airstrip of beaten earth and dirt. Lalibela has a dozen rock-cut churches, the largest, Medhare Alem is 100ft. long, rectangular and 13th century.

We flaw next day to Gondar through the Somien mountains. Several of the peaks were above our plane, but as the atmosphere was so clear it was perfectly safe.

After Gondar and its 16-18th century palaces and fortified medieval monastery we flew across the source of the Blue Nile, Lake Tana to Bahar Dar. A boat trip on the lake next morning took us to a round church of the 17th century which was lavishly decorated with frescoes of saints, apostles and other ecclesiastical 'what-nots'. In the afternoon we were driven to the Tissisat falls over 1000ft. wide and 200-300ft. deep.

Addis Ababa was our next stop for a day, but as it was founded in the 19th century, it lacks interest, unlike the rest of Ethiopia. We flew in a DC-6 (still propellors, but a bit more modern) to Dire Dawa. Not far from the city are some caves once inhabited by ancient man. We drove out to visit the most accessible one on a dirt track road, the last half mile was on foot. We forded a shallow stream and as my feet were sweating this was a bonus. The cave was near the top of a 500ft. hillock. The hillocks sides were boulders and although it was steep we clambered up them. The chief feature of the cave was a hunting scene and I asked the guide roughly what age 10,20,30,000 years? Prehistoric' was all she knew. The animals in the scene were about one inch, roughly the same as: the hunters - all in black or grey. From this inadequate description can any body give me any information?

Next day we drove to Harar a walled city with a predominantly Muslim population. We flew back to Addis Ababa in another DC-6, and the following day a modern jet of Ethiopian Airways took us back to London, and me to the misery of censuses and surveys in Somerset House.


